Inner Child Lecture, Workshop Nov. 6 and 7

he MSTG and the Minnesota Art Therapy Association (MNATA) are co-sponsoring a lecture and experiential workshop called "Recovery of Your Inner Child" Nov. 6 and 7 with Lucia Capacchione, Ph.D., A.T.R.

Known for her discovery of the healing power of writing and drawing with the non-dominant hand. Lucia Capacchione is an art therapist with doctorate in psychology who serves as a consultant Walt Disney to Imagineering and nationally recognized as an author and workshop facilitator. Her books include The Power of Your

Other Hand, The Creative Journal, and Recovery of Your Inner Child.

Both the lecture and the workshop will be held at Plymouth Congregational Church at 1900 Nicollet Avenue, Minneapolis. The lecture is Friday, Nov. 6, 7:30-9:30 p.m., and the workshop is Saturday, Nov. 7, 8:30 a.m.- 5 p.m. Cost is \$75 for members, \$90 for non-members. Cost for the lecture only

Participants at the Saturday workshop must attend the Friday night lecture and are strongly encouraged to read *Recovery of Your Inner Child* before the workshop.

While use of the terminology "Inner Child work" is currently

widespread, Dr. Capacchione's workshops are distinguished by an emphasis on experiential techniques including drawing, writing, voice dialogue and movement designed to provide safe first-hand experiences of the Inner Child.

In Recovery of Your Inner Child, Dr. Capacchione says, "It is one thing to talk about the Inner Child, it is

another thing to consciously experience it as a real living presence.... Unless we enter into the Child state in a safe setting the Child Within will remain isolated and alone. Unless we reclaim our childlike feelings, sensitivity, wonderment and aliveness, our Inner Child will remain wounded."

In the same book, Dr. Capacchione discloses that her own personal journey toward recovering and healing the Inner Child was precipitated by a life-threatening physical illness. While literally struggling for survival, she found that writing and drawing in a personal journal were key elements of her healing process.

"The art that poured forth at this time was clearly coming from the unconscious. It had a strangely mysterious quality, as though I was writing in a foreign tongue. It was filled with symbols that I did not understand intellectually, but which spoke directly to my soul. After these drawings I always felt better physically and emotionally.

"In this early drawing, (see illustration) a child appears underground crouching in a fetal position. Her tears of sorrow are watering the roots of a tree in which a heart has been split in half by storms. But high up in the sky is a butterfly, a harbinger of new beginnings. When I did this drawing, I had no idea what I was doing or why. The images appeared mysteriously on the page, as if my hand had done the drawing on its own, much like automatic writing.

participants, we will travel by van to Chichen Itza where we will visit the "newest" of the ruins. During the sound and light show that evening, we will see the descending serpent on "El Castillo" (the major pyramid), a dramatic introduction to our exploration of the vision serpent. During the next six days, we will travel back in time visiting the increasingly older ruins of Uxmal, Labna, Sayil, Kabah, and Palenque. The cost for the week: \$750, includes lodging, some meals, ground transportation, round trip air fare to Palenque, guides, and registration.

Week Two- (January 25-February 1) In the residential seminar in Akumal, we will continue to explore Maya symbols and rituals. We will focus our discussions on selected symbols and rituals, including the vision serpent, pyramids, caves, caverns, and cenotes (wells), and the Tree of Life. We will have ample opportunities to experience and see the symbols of the ancient and present day Maya. We will visit the nearby ruins of Tulum at sunrise, if approved by the Mexican government. In Coba, a

major ceremonial site of the ancients, we will climb the tallest pyramid in the Yucatan to experience sunset over the jungle. In Xel-ha we will stand beneath the sacred Ceiba tree and experience its grandeur. We will swim and dive in a cenote and visit a cave in which the ancient altar still holds carved stones for burning copal. Cost for the week: \$550 to \$650 (depending on type of accommodation chosen), includes lodging, some meals, ground transportation, guides, and registration. Airfare to Cancun will be up to the individual.

Akumal (Maya for "place of the turtles") is a quiet village on the white sands of the Mexican Caribbean in the heart of Maya culture. Accommodations will be the participant's choice of sharing a house on the quiet waters of Yalcul Lagoon or an ocean-front condo on nearby Half-Moon Bay. There will be ample time to snorkel the beautiful waters of the lagoon or bay, walk on the long white beaches of Sian Kan, or read under a palm.

Six Internships Sponsored at Two Locations

The MSTG is sponsoring six internships for therapists at two locations for the academic year 1992-93.

Four interns will provide 20 therapy sessions to each of 10 inner city children at St. Stephen's Catholic School in Minneapolis. This is the second year of MSTG internships at St. Stephen's. Barbara Weller will supervise.

Also, two interns will team with two client advocates at Incarnation House, a Minneapolis residence for women and their children. May of the women have been physically or sexually abused, have abused drugs or alcohol, and have been in trouble with the law. As a result, many of them have difficulty managing their children.

The therapy with the women will focus on bonding and attachment issues through the use of the multi-sensory ("floor games") work developed by Agnes (Nessie) Bayley and her colleagues of England. Supervision will be provided by Barbara Weller who has studied with Nessie and who has been teaching the material here.

The internships provide a rich opportunity for therapists to offer free community service, as well as deepen their own training through supervision.

The interns at St. Stephen's for this year include Priscilla Braun, Grace Hong, Kate Davis Rogers, and Carol Tellett. The interns at Incarnation House are Carol Kindschi and Joe Meyer.

Course Offerings in Sandplay Therapy, 1993

The Minnesota Sandplay Therapy Group is sponsoring two courses in Sandplay Therapy during the 1992-93 academic year. Both courses are intended for therapists who have completed their individual sandplay work and are using, or intend to use sandplay in their work with clients. The instructor for both classes is Barbara Weller, who is certified by the International Society for Sandplay Therapists (ISST) to provide Sandplay training. Sandplay supervision groups also will be offered.

BEGINNING SANDPLAY PRACTICE

- is open to those who have completed their individual sandplay work and are licensed or otherwise certified to provide psychotherapy in Minnesota.
- will meet for eight two hour sessions on the third Wednesday of each month beginning on October 21.
- content will include: Sandplay in the context of other forms of therapy; the elements of Sandplay; ethical issues; assessment of a client's readiness to use Sandplay; the Sandplay process, from initial session, encountering the shadow, constellation of the Self in Sandplay, relativization of the ego, and termination of the process; transference and co-transference; recordkeeping; and researching sandplay symbols.
- size will be limited to eight participants. The course will be cancelled if there are fewer than five registrants.
- cost is \$240. Registrants are asked to make a deposit of \$100 at the time of registration. Balance is due January 1, 1993. Registrants are expected to pay for all classes, whether or not they attend them.
- participation will count as 16 seminar hours toward the 100 required for those pursuing ISST certification.

ADVANCED SANDPLAY SEMINAR

- is open to those who have completed their individual sandplay work, have taken Beginning Sandplay Practice, and wish to explore Sandplay therapy in more depth, using material from their own clinical work.
- content will focus on the archetype of the Shadow.
- classes will begin with a full day workshop on "Monsters, Shadow and Transformation" on Saturday, October 10, and will continue with as many two hour evening seminars as there are participants in the class, to allow each to present and discuss his or her own work relevant to this topic. Seminars will be scheduled at the mutual convenience of the participants and instructor.
- cost will be \$80 for the Saturday workshop, and \$30—\$32 for each of the evening seminars. Participants will be expected to pay for all seminars, whether they attend them or not. Deposit of \$100 due at registration, balance 1/1/93
- all hours will count toward the 100 required for ISST certification.

SANDPLAY SUPERVISION GROUPS

- are open to licensed or otherwise certified therapists who have completed their individual Sandplay work and are currently using Sandplay in their clinical practice.
- will begin in October, and will consist of 4 or fewer therapists and the supervisor, Barbara Weller.
- cost will be divided among the participants; total cost for each two hour session will be \$160; four participants would each pay \$40.
- hours of actual supervision on cases will count toward the 30 required for ISST supervision; hours discussing the cases of other participants count toward the 100 required seminar hours.

The symbols came from a very deep corner of the unconscious."

Dr. Capacchione's lecture will focus on theoretical background for Inner Child work including exploration of mythology and fairy tales centered on the Child Archetype. On Saturday, Dr. Capacchione will guide participants through a series of experiences with the goals of discovering the Inner Child, exploring the Inner Parent, and celebrating the creative and spiritual child.

Workshop participants are asked to bring drawing materials such as crayons, pastels and/or felt-tip pens, and prepare to let the child come out to play.
